MIN 01/03/2018: OPENING PRAYERS

The meeting was called to order by the Senior Chief Fundisa Location Mr Francis Kazungu Ngala at 1213 hours. He called upon Pastor Joram Shida to offer opening prayers. A self-introduction then followed.

MIN/02/03/2018: REMARKS FROM THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BARAZA

This public baraza was chaired by the Senior Chief-Fundisa Location; Mr. Francis Kazungu Ngala. In his opening remarks, the chairman welcomed all present and informed the residents that they have guests who are; representatives of Alsherman Limited, and the Environmental Impact Assessment Expert and his team. He then went further to briefly introduce the agenda of the day as a stakeholders (community) consultation to gather views, concerns and suggestions as part of an environmental impact assessment study for a proposed salt works to be set up by Alsherman Limited. The chairman then welcomed the Environmental Impact Assessment Expert to explain the agenda of the day to the attendants.

MIN 03/3/2018: PRESENTATION BY THE LEAD EXPERT, MR. PHILIP MANYI OMENGE

The Lead Expert said that the Environmental Management and Coordination Act (EMCA) No. 8 of 1999 (Amended) 2015 requires that planned projects that fall under the second schedule as per legal notice number 150 of 2016 are required to undertake an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Study before implementation. He went on to say that the proposed salt works by Al-Sherman Limited falls under the second schedule as described in legal notice 150 of 2016 and thus the reason why the company is undertaking the environmental impact assessment study. The Expert said the National Environment Management Authority (NEMA) has registered and licensed Environmental Impact Assessment/Environmental Audit experts to carry out EIAs, he said he is one of the licensed EIA Lead experts. The expert went on to say that Al-Sherman Limited has contracted him and his team to carry out the EIA for the proposed salt works. He went on to say that the Environmental (Impact Assessment and Audit) Regulation of 2003 outline the procedure to be followed in undertaking EIA. He said that regulation 17 of legal notice number 101 of 2003 provides for public participation during the EIA process. The expert went on to say that the baraza was an important forum for community participation in the EIA process. He urged all present to participate fully by airing their issues, concerns and suggestions. He said that this was the first of three public barazas to be held for the proposed salt works. The expert said that a detailed questionnaire survey would be carried out within the project area after the public barazas are concluded. The expert said that other baseline studies would then follow with in the proposed project area. He said once data collection was completed, his team will compile an environmental impact assessment study report which will be submitted to the National Environment Management Authority. He said that the authority will call for comments on the report from the public and he urged the residents once they read the notices on the Kenya Gazzette and the local daily papers to access the report, read it and present their comments to the Authority. He requested all the people present to participate fully in the baraza by presenting their views, suggestions and concerns regarding the proposed salt works by Al-Sherman Limited.

MIN 04/03/2018: REMARKS FROM AL-SHERMAN LIMITED BY SEIF ATHMAN

Mr. Seif first recognised those present including the area Senior Chief, Mr. Francis Kazungu Ngala, the Environmental Consultants and all residents of Msumarini and neighbouring villages with Fundisa-Marereni Location present. Presenting the agenda of the meeting Mr.

Seif said, Al-Sherman Limited proposes to put up a salt works at Msumarini area within Fundisa-Marereni Location within Magarini Sub-County, Kilifi County. He acknowledged that a part of their land has squatters and that the proposed development will begin with the section of the land that is without squatters pending resolution of the squatter issues in the other sections. He went on to say that as per the requirement of the environmental laws Al-Sherman Limited is carrying out an environmental impact assessment study for the proposed salt works. He said that is why the baraza was convened to consult the community on the salt works. He encouraged all present to actively participate and present the views and concerns during the plenary session.

MIN/05/03/2018: REMARKS FROM THE AREA SENIOR CHIEF FUNDISA-MARERENI LOCATION MR. FRANCIS KAZUNGU NGALA.

In his opening remarks, the senior chief welcomed all present including the representative of Al-Sherman Limited, the Environmental Impact Assessment Expert and his team and the residents. He emphasized the importance of active participation to the agenda of the day by the residents. He noted that this is the first of three public barazas that will be held for the purposes of consultation for the proposed project. He urged those present to ask whatever questions they may have and put forward their suggestions on the proposed project.

MIN 06/03/2018: OPEN PLENARY

Safari Katana Kalume (From Kanagoni Village): Mr. Safari Katana Kalume began by registering his appreciation for being consulted on the proposed project. He then sought clarification whether they will have access to the findings of the EIA study report as members of the local community.

Felix Yawa (From Msumarini Village): He made the following comments:

That he supports the proposed salt works because it will create employment for the youth and lead to general development of the area.

Mary Gafo: She made the following comments:

That she supports the proposed salt works because it will create employment for the women and youth in the area. He urged the management of Al-Sherman Limited to give priority to the local youth for employment opportunities.

Dickson Nyale Ngowa: He said that he supports the proposed project. He said that more job opportunities should be given to the residents of the area.

Samson Menza: He made the following comments:

He supported the proposed salt works on grounds that it will create employment opportunities for the locals and hence more income to cater for bills such as school fees.

Thomas Menza (From Msumarini Village): He began by registering his gratitude for being consulted on the proposed project. He said implementation of the proposed project will create job opportunities for the people and hence help reduce some of the social ills such as petty theft within the community. He said working at the salt works means the people will get income that will enable them pay school fees for their children. He said once the proposed project is in place, it will lead to the growth and development of Msumarini township, siting the rapid growth of the neighbouring Marereni Township owing to a salt firm next to it. He however noted that there is bound to be negative impacts from implementation of the proposed project and he requested that such negative impacts be adequately mitigated as and when they arise. He also said requested that access routes used by the community members that trespass through the Al-Sherman land be provided for as the project is implemented.

Harrison Kazungu: He said that, if possible, the section of the Al-Sherman land occupied by squatters be allocated to the squatters.

Jonathan Ziro: Mr. Jonathan Ziro said he supports the project noting that it will create employment opportunities for the locals and generally help develop the area, siting the following examples:

- i. That the developer has already helped put up a school on the neighbouring Kadzuyuni village.
- ii. That the developer has helped put up an office for a local Community Based Organisation-MMKADO
- iii. That the developer has helped put up the assistant chief's office-Marereni Sub-Location.

MIN 07/03/2018: PRESENTATION BY REPRESENTATIVES OF LOCAL NGOS, CBOs AND OTHER ORGANISED COMMUNITY GROUPS

MMKADO: Mr. Harrison Kingi Kalama, speaking on behalf of MMKADO-a local community based organisation-began by acknowledging the presences of those present

including the Adu Ward Member of County Assembly and also the deputy speaker of the Kilifi County Assesbly, the Adu Ward Liaison Officer at the Office of the Magarini Constituency Member of Parliament, the Adu Ward Administrator, the Kenya Association of Manufacturers-Salt Sub-Sector Liaison Officer, the Senior Chief-Fundisa Location, the EIA Expert and his team and the rest of the attendants. He noted that there have been a series of meetings in the past between the developer and members of the local community geared towards solving the squatter issues and paving way for the development of the salt works. Such meetings he noted resulted into some form of agreement that the squatters would not be evicted and that the salt works will only be developed on the parcel without squatters. He however noted they are afraid that such agreements may be negated by the developer in the course of implementation of the proposed project. He mentioned that there are two seasonal streams flowing through the Al-Sherman land and he therefore wanted to know how the streams will be dealt with during implementation of the proposed project. He enquired whether a buffer zone will be maintained between the community and the salt works once developed to shield members of the community from the glare. He said that there are water wells within the vicinity of the proposed project site and that the quality of the water from these wells may be affected by the development of the proposed project. He requested that once the proposed project is developed, the local community should benefit more, with at least 75% of the jobs going to them and the developer to help initiate development projects in the area like a dispensary at the neighbouring Msumarini area. He sought clarification whether the EIA exercise touches on the parcels of land with squatters or it will just be concentrated on the vacant parcel of land where the development of the salt works is set to begin from. Concluding, he asked for a similar forum to the baraza to discuss the outcome of the report once data collection for the EIA has been concluded and a report compiled.

Community Forest Association (CFA). Mr. Jeremiah Ngumbao speaking on behalf of the Marereni Community Forest Association (CFA) said he supports the development of the proposed salt works stating the following reasons:-

That it will aid conservation efforts of mangroves at the creek because people will have jobs and hence they will not destroy mangrove areas anymore trying to fend for their families. He noted that this will eventually render the sea more beneficial to the fishermen because breeding areas for fish and other sea life will be enhanced. He said once the proposed Salt works has been developed, job opportunities should be distributed equally among the four villages neighbouring the proposed project site, namely; Msumarini, Kadyuyuni, Muyu wa

Kae and Dhololo Bula. He said as a community forest association, they fully support the 90-day no logging directive issued recently by the deputy president and warned that any one found on the wrong will be dealt with the full force of the law.

Malindi Rights Forum (MRF). Mr. Sifa Edward of the MRF in his contribution raised the following points.

- i. Streams passing through the proposed project site should not be interfered with but rather left to flow naturally.
- ii. Water wells within the vicinity of the proposed project site be well developed for use by the members of the community.
- iii. Sections of the developer's land occupied by squatters should be left intact and that squatters should not be evicted.
- iv. Employment opportunities arising from the proposed development be offered on merit and rights of employees be respected.
- v. All workers that shall be involved in the activities of the proposed salt works be provided with the appropriate personal protective gears.
- vi. The mangrove areas should not be destroyed.
- vii. Health assessment programmes be carried out within members of the community to establish a baseline on which effects of the proposed development on health of the locals will be determined.
- viii. He called for co-operation between the developer, local leadership and members of the community.

Natural Justice. Mr. Charo Popo Gona started by registering his appreciation for being consulted on the proposed project. He called on the developer to strictly adhere to the conditions of the EIA license in case the proposed project is approved and a license issued by the Authority.

Pastors' Association. Pastor Joram Shida in his contribution said that he supports the development of the proposed project as it will help local churches to grow because members of the church will have income to support church programmes. He requested that once the proposed project is implemented, special attention be given to members of the community that are too close to the project site to ensure that they are not excessively affected negatively.

CSR Committee Salt Sub-Sector. Mr. Elvis Kazungu of the CSR Committee raised the following points;

- i. The developer should help support education within the area.
- ii. The parcels of land occupied by squatters be allocated to the squatters.
- iii. He said as a committee, they shall put together all the request made by members of the public at the baraza and present an official request to the developer.
- iv. He called for co-operation between the developer and members of the community going forward.
- v. He urged members of the community to make use of local CBOs, NGOs, local administration and local leadership in seeking useful information and resolving differences that may arise between the developer and members of the community.

MIN 08/03/2018: PRESENTATION BY LOCAL LEADERSHIP

Adu Ward Administrator. The Adu Ward administrator Mr. Vincent Yeri began by acknowledging the presence of the attendees including the Adu Ward Member of County Assembly and also the deputy speaker of the Kilifi County Assesbly, the Adu Ward Liaison Officer at the Office of the Magarini Constituency Member of Parliament, the Kenya Association of Manufacturers-Salt Sub-Sector Liaison Officer, the Senior Chief-Fundisa Location, the EIA Expert and his team and the rest of the attendants. He thank the people for participation fully.

Adu Liaison Officer for the Magarini Constituency Member of Parliament. Mr. Samson Zia Kahindi, the Adu Ward Liaison Officer in the office of the Magarini Constituency Member of parliament, began by acknowledging the presences of those present including the Adu Ward Member of County Assembly and also the deputy speaker of the Kilifi County Assessable, the Adu Ward Administrator, the Kenya Association of Manufacturers-Salt Sub-Sector Liaison Officer, the Senior Chief-Fundisa Location, the EIA Expert and his team and the rest of the attendants. He urged the expert to make sure that all the contributions made by the members of the community are factored in the report. He requested that a similar forum be convened to review the findings of the EIA report once the report is compiled. He said that the proposed project should strictly take place on the parcel of land without squatters and that a similar forum be convened to discuss the plight of the squatters at such a time when the developer wants to utilize the parcels of land under squatters. He urged the CSR Committee, local CBOs and NGOs to follow-up on suggestions made by the community to make sure that they are taken care of.

Adu Ward Member of County Assembly and Kilifi County Assembly Deputy Speaker. Mr. Stanley Karisa Kenga the Adu Ward Member of County Assembly and Kilifi County Assembly Deputy Speaker, began by acknowledging the Almighty God for having made the convening of the baraza possible on this particular day. He delivered apologies from the area Member of Parliament Magarini Constituency and that he hopes he will grace at least one of the remaining two barazas. He then acknowledged the presence of those attending including the Adu Ward Liaison Officer at the Office of the Magarini Constituency Member of Parliament, the Adu Ward Administrator, the Kenya Association of Manufacturers-Salt Sub-Sector Liaison Officer, the Senior Chief-Fundisa Location, the EIA Expert and his team and the rest of the attendants. He reiterated the agenda of the day as being a stakeholders (community) consultation to gather views, concerns and suggestions as part of an environmental impact assessment study for a proposed salt works to be set up by Alsherman Limited. He noted that in the past, there have been a series of meetings in the past between the developer and members of the local community geared towards solving the squatter issues and paving way for the development of the salt works. Such meetings he noted resulted into some form of agreement that the squatters would not be evicted and that the salt works will only be developed on the parcel without squatters. He said that the latest efforts of resolving the land issue between the developer and the squatters saw the National Land Commission Chair Mr. Mohammed Swazuri come to the site, where together with the local leadership and the developer they agreed that surveyor will be sent to the site to ascertain the land boundaries before any processes towards the development of the salt works commence, to his amazement however he said he wonders that the EIA process has commenced even before the surveyors have come as agreed. He urged the developer that priority should be given to the locals for job opportunities. He urged the area youth to acquire relevant skills as they prepare themselves to take up such jobs. He urged the developer to put up measures not to pollute the environment especially the sea, mangrove areas, local streams and shallow water wells in the area. He also said that an assessment into alleged health effects of salt works be conducted.

MIN. 9/03/2018. CONTRIBUTIONS FROM VILLAGE ELDERS

Msumarini A. Mr Joseph Kambi, the Msumarini A village elder said that the proposed project will help improve the security in the areas neighbouring the proposed project site because people will be able to earn from working at the salt works hence reducing cases of petty theft like stealing chicken.

Msumarini B. Mzee Katana Mdhenge, the Msumarini B village elder requested that the squatters be left intact and only the land without squatters be developed.

Dhololo-Bula. Mr. Rajab Mramba, the Dhololo Bula village elder said that he supports the project. He noted that residents of his village have been sidelined in the ongoing bush clearing job opportunities at the proposed project site and that he hoped they will also be absorbed into the jobs at the site as the project takes shape.

Muyu wa Kae A. Mr. Charles Charo, the Muyu wa Kae A village elder registered his gratitude to the developer for having consulted them from the very start of the proposed project and urged them to involve the community all through the project life. He lamented that members of his village are complaining of being sidelined for jobs offered by the developer.

Mtsangamali. Mr. Gabriel Mangi Yaa, the Mtsangamali village elder urged the developer to involve the local community at every stage of the project life just as it is happening at this stage of the environmental impact assessment.

Kadzuyuni C. Mama Kadii Kitsao the Kadzuyuni C village elder noted that cases of insecurity within her village are still high and that he hopes with the coming of the proposed project such cases will be a thing of the past. She registered fears that water wells in the area are likely to be affected negatively and thus urged the developer in such a case, he should avail potable water safe for use by members of the community.

Msumarini C. Mama Bendera Yaa, the Msumarini C village elder called for co-operation between the developer and members of the community.

Muyu wa Kae D. The Muyu wa Kae D village elder noted that cases of petty theft are still rife within the area and that he has fallen victim himself having lost 18 chicken to the hands of thieves, he therefore urged the developer to employ more people from the local community to help reduce such cases.

MIN. 9/03/2018. PRESENTATION BY THE LIAISON OFFICER-KENYA ASSOCIATION OF MANUFACTURERS SALT SUB-SECTOR

Mr. Patrick Gambo the liaison officer-Kenya Association of Manufacturers Salt Sub-Sector in his presentation requested the expert that in future barazas, he involved NEMA officer so that they can respond to questions that directly touch on them. He said that all CSR projects

requested by the community will be put together and formerly be presented to the developer by the CSR Committee. He said that it's important a health assessment is carried out within members of the community to establish a baseline on which effects of the proposed development on health of the locals will be determined. He noted that in the past there have been complaints on the violation of human rights by developers in the area where cases of sexual abuse and child labour have risen, he therefore urged both the developer and the members of the local community to be vigilant not to find themselves on the wrong side of the law. He called for co-operation and constant dialogue between the developer and members of the community going forward.

MIN. 10/03/2018. RESPONSES TO SOME OF THE QUESTIONS

Responses by Mr. Seif Athman Representative Al-Sherman Limited

1. On issues of access routes that are used by members of the community, Mr. Seif said that the company will designate access routes especially at the periphery of the salt works to be used by the community.
2. On issues of employment opportunities, he said that the company is doing its best to offer opportunities to as many people as possible during this preliminary stage of project implementation but it is limited with inadequate resources. He urged the people to cooperate with the company to see the project pick up and that way more job opportunities will be available. He also urged them to equip themselves with the right skills for jobs at the salt works.

Responses by the Lead Expert

On whether the members of the community will have access to the findings of the EIA report, the Lead Expert reiterated that once data collection is completed, his team will compile an environmental impact assessment study report which will be submitted to the National Environment Management Authority. He said that the authority dispatch copies of the report to relevant lead agencies and also post it on its official website. Thereafter, the Authority will call for comments on the report from the public and he urged the residents once they read the notices on the Kenya Gazette and the local daily papers to access the report, read it and present their comments to the Authority.

On whether streams and wells will be interfered with, the Lead Expert said that detailed baseline studies will be conducted and mapping done. He said that according to the law,

water resources are public resources and that they will not be interfered with. He said in the EIA report they will recommend that all laws protecting water bodies be followed

Remarks by the Senior Chief Fundisa Location

The Senior Chief Fundisa Location Mr. Francis Kazungu Ngala thanked all participants for actively participating and making the baraza a success. He retaliated that all the environmental issues should be addressed appropriately in the environmental impact assessment study report as per the appropriate legal provisions. He urged Al-Sherman Limited to consider the requested corporate social responsibility projects, as a good neighbour. He urged the residents to co-operate with the developer and that way, they will realise the benefits of the proposed project giving the example of the neighbouring Gongoni Township that has realised significant growth over the years because of a salt firm next to it. He told the attendants that there are still two more barazas and he urged them to come in their numbers and present their views.

Class 8 and Form 4 Leavers Meeting. Mr. Samson Zia Kahindi the Adu Liaison officer at the office of the Magarini Constituency Member of Parliament announced a meeting to be held at Gongoni Township where various local colleges and sponsors will be meeting Class 8 and Form 4 leavers and chatting the way forward in terms of furthering their education. This was also reiterated by the Adu Ward administrator and the Member of County Assembly, Adu Ward.

High School at Msumarini, Play Ground and Ward Bursaries. The Member of County Assembly, Adu Ward who also doubles up as the deputy speaker of the Kilifi County Assembly Mr. Stanley Karisa Kenga announced to the attendants that plans are under way to put up a high school within the Msumarini Township by the end of next year to help relieve pressure off the nearby Marereni Secondary School which he noted was full of students way beyond its capacity. He also mentioned that a play ground will soon be constructed at Msumarini. He urged the people to apply for the bursaries offered by the ward for school going children.

Respect of herder for farmlands. Mr. Joseph Kambi, the Msumarini A village elder urged herders to handle their herds with care and not let them graze on peoples crops especially

during this farming season. This was reiterated by the Senior Chief Fundisa Location Mr. Francis ngala Kazungu.

Land Documents, National Identity Cards and Marriage Certificates. Mr. Patrick Gambo the Kenya Association of Manufacturers-Salt Belt Sub-Sector Liaison Officer urged the attendants to make sure they have the necessary documents for the parcels of land and pursue and acquire national identity cards and marriage certificates.

No logging directive and Illegal brew ban. The Senior Chief said they are enforcing the 90-day no-logging directive issued by the deputy president and the ban on illegal brew and that anyone found on the wrong side of the law will be dealt with decisively.

Census, 2019. The Senior Chief said that village elders and wazee wa nyumba kumi are moving around homesteads collecting information in preparation for the census slated for next year and he urged the people to offer the necessary co-operation.

Education. The Senior Chief urged the people to take education of their kids seriously, take their children to school and be responsible in school fees payment, heeding to calls by teachers in school and follow-up on important matters involving their children such as acquisition of birth certificates.

Petty crime. The Senior Chief issued a warning to those that will be caught involving themselves with petty crimes such as the rampant theft of chicken in the area.

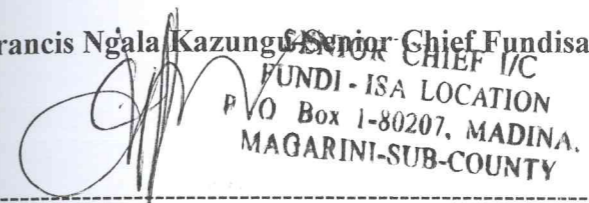
